

MAIN GALLERY

Situated on the main floor foyers and halls of the Etobicoke Civic Centre, exhibitions have been enjoyed by art enthusiasts and those visiting the civic centre since 1976.

There are 10 shows annually, with most exhibition running for one month each, accompanied by public receptions. Admission and receptions are free.



ASCENT GALLERY

In 2023, the Ascent Gallery opened on Level 1 of the Etobicoke Civic Centre’s Central Block. This gallery is dedicated to early-career artists and collectives, with a focus on those from equity-deserving communities, living and working in Toronto.

There are four shows annually, with most exhibitions running for 10 weeks each, accompanied by public receptions. Admission and receptions are free.

The Main Gallery welcomes applications from art groups that have a minimum of four artists. The submissions deadline is May 1.

Ascent Gallery invites applications from early-career artists and collectives with the deadline of July 15.

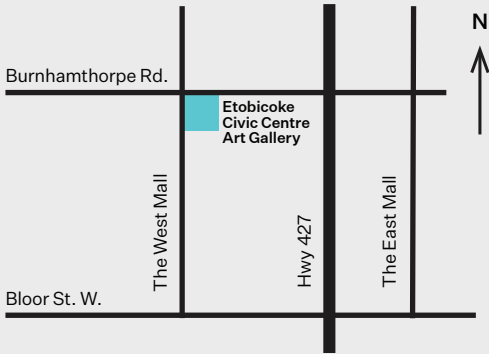

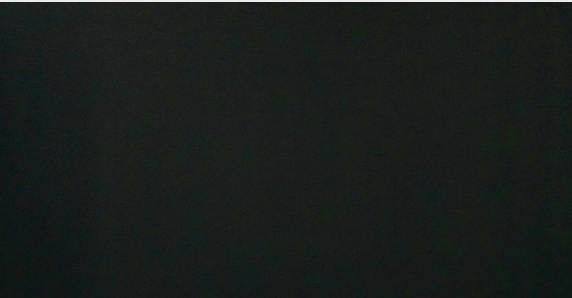
Coyotes by Daniel St-Amant

REGRET EXHIBITION



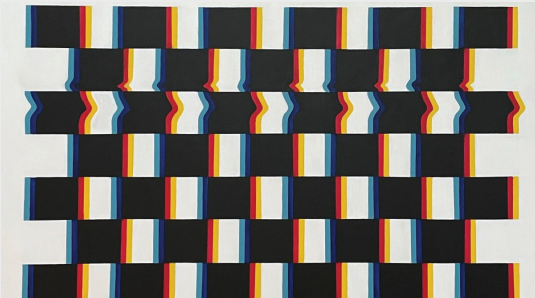
Leaving Eden by Nancy Paul
